I MADE A GOLEM BUT THE GOLEM MADE ME

THE IMPORTANCE OF LEGACY: COLLECTING FAMILY HISTORY

Even though she worked for decades as a journalist, Rachele Unreich never thought to collect her family history, and only did so with her mother as an afterthought. Since her mother's death, she combed through archives, photographs, family artefacts and questioned relatives around the world, so she could accurately tell her mother Mira's story in her book, A Brilliant Life. Since then, she has urged people to collect their own family histories, and advised them where to start.

THE FAVOURED DIASPORA: THE STATUS OF U.S. JEWISH-ISRAEL RELATIONS

U.S. Jews were galvanized after Oct. 7 to reestablish a tradition of wall-to-wall support for Israel, with a mass rally in Washington in November. The coalition helped secure emergency funding for Israel's war effort. But now, long-simmering distrust of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is resurfacing as tensions heat up between the Biden and Netanyahu governments.

Since Oct 7, there has been an exponential increase in antisemitism experienced around Aotearoa, especially in schools. Join the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand's Education Director to hear how HCNZ is combating this rise in antisemitism and discuss what's going on in your children's schools. This will be 30 - 45 minutes of presentation with another 30 – 45 minutes of Q&A for parents, and especially students, to ask questions about what to do if they experience antisemitism.

SCHMENDRICK, SCHLEMIEL, SCHLIMAZEL - THE ROLE OF THE LOSER IN JEWISH COMEDY

The loser is hard to avoid in Jewish comedy. From the schlemiel (who spills the soup) to the schlimazel (who has the soup spilled on them), they have proved to be a staple in Jewish comedy from the Bible to today. Come discuss different Jewish loser archetypes, as we trace their prevalence across page, stage and screen.

CHARITY: OBLIGATION, TRADITION, OR ALTRUISM?

Unravel the complexities surrounding charitable giving in Judaism. Explore whether charity is mandated by the Torah, prescribed by rabbinic law, or simply considered a virtuous act. Join the discussion on the multifaceted role of charity in Jewish ethics and practice.

And far-left activists who accuse Israel of committing genocide and Biden of enabling it plan on bringing the protests that disrupted American campuses to the Democratic convention in Chicago.

A BRILLIANT LIFE: THE LESSONS I LEARNED FROM MY HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR MOTHER

When Rachelle Unreich's mother Mira was dying, she decided to interview her. Not just to find out what happened to her in the Holocaust - at 17, she survived four concentration camps, including Auschwitz - but to try to discover the secret behind her survival. How had she gone on to live with such joy afterwards? How could she say, "In the Holocaust, I learned about the goodness of people?" A story of luck, serendipity and the unbreakable bond between mothers and daughters.

We will explore how our Jewish institutions in NZ might respond to this intractable problem by considering the model of Moishe House, and the thriving and engaged community it has built in Auckland for young Jewish adults and professionals since 2016.

MAKING JEWISH THEATRE: AN INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION DEVELOPING THE NEW PLAY GLIMPSES - A STAGE ADAPTATION OF THE BIOGRAPHY OF MARIA DRONKE

Here from New York for the workshop week and reading of the new play GLIMPSES, theatre director Illana Stein is in conversation with writer Yael Gezentsvey about their work developing this stage adaptation, based on the biography of Maria Dronke, GLIMPSES OF AN ACTING LIFE by Monica Tempian, published by Playmarket. Maria Dronke was a star of the European stage who fled Nazi Germany to the UK, subsequently arriving in New Zealand where she would go on to change the face of New Zealand theatre, training the country's first generation of theatre icons. Readings by Dronke biographer Monica Tempian will provide rich glimpses of one of New Zealand's artistic heroes. This conversation will also include insights into Illana's involvement with the Jewish Plays Project (NYC), and the Alliance for Jewish Theatre. Yael and Illana first worked together on GLIMPSES, when it was accepted into the Alliance for Jewish Theatre's New Play Lab and they are thrilled to continue their collaboration developing this piece.

AGAINST IDEAS: THE PLEASURE OF DISCOVERY IN POETRY

Maybe you have a great idea for a poem. Or maybe you can't come up with a single idea for a poem. It doesn't matter. It really doesn't. In fact, it can be better if you don't have a single idea. The poet Paul Valéry famously tells a story about Edgar Degas: The painter, who wrote poems from time to time, complained to Stéphan Mallarmé, "I can't manage to say what I want, and yet I'm full of ideas." Mallarmé's response is a simple but instructive one: "My dear Degas," Mallarmé said, "one does not make poetry with ideas, but with words." Want to write a poem? Come to this workshop where we'll put Mallarmé to the test. Bring a pen and paper or a computer or tablet—but it's okay to leave your ideas at home.

As a palliative medicine physician and an assisted dying researcher, we might be assumed to have opposing perspectives on end-of life-issues. We invite you to join us to have a frank and open dialogue on issues related to death and dying, including assisted dying. We will call on aspects of philosophy, ethics, religion, sociology and medicine to examine assisted dying and end-of-life care and the plurality of Jewish interpretations of these practices. We hope this discussion will help people have those hard conversations about death and dying, and reflect on the things that are important to them.

EXPLORING WHAT JUDAISM HAS TO SAY ON AI AND HUMAN CLONING*

Delve into the ethical and moral dimensions of cutting-edge technology. Uncover insightful parallels and contrasts between Jewish teachings and the forefront of scientific innovation, challenging assumptions and fostering meaningful dialogue.

PSYCHEDELIC JUDAISM

Interest in the clinical and recreational use of psychedelic substances (LSD, psilocybin, DMT, MDMA, ketamine) has grown enormously in recent years. Concurrently, there has been rapid development of research and scientific understanding of how these drugs affect the brain and may help to treat conditions as diverse as depression, anxiety, PTSD, and addiction. Less well-known is how Jews regard use of these drugs, and what impacts their use may have on secular and religious Jewish identity.

ACCESS TO JUSTICE

This session will cover access to justice in the U.S., including wrestling with why it is important as a matter of racial justice and the extent to which it exists for those unable to afford it. We will describe efforts by the organized American Jewish community to contribute to closing the justice gap, and close with considerations for New Zealand in this time of budget austerity.
